Advice on using e-scooters



E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the <u>Road Traffic Act 1988</u>. This means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters including the need to have a valid driving licence, vehicle insurance and road tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private e-scooter you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

Legal use of an e-scooter

Some local councils are running trial e-scooter rental schemes. Provided you are over 18, have a driving licence and follow road traffic regulations it is legal to use a rental e-scooter in participating boroughs. Please note Haringey Council is not part of any trial e-scooter scheme, it is therefore illegal to ride an e-scooter on any public roads, pavements or cycle paths in Haringey.

It is legal to use an e-scooter on private land only with the permission of the land owner.

Are e-scooters permitted on school premises?

No, students are not legally permitted to ride an e-scooter therefore e-scooters must not be brought to or stored at school at anytime. GCS takes no responsibility for the loss, damage or theft of these devices if stored on school grounds.

Advice on using LimeBikes

LimeBike provide electric scooters and bicycles for short term rental for local journeys. Users must first set up an account via the LimeBike app. As stated in the 'Terms and Conditions' of LimeBike:



- Account holders must be over 18.
- To ride an electric scooter or electric bicycle you must hold a valid provisional or full drivers licence.
- A user's account is connected to the user's debit card and each time a LimeBike is used the cost of rental and mileage is charged to the users debit card.
- An account is personal to each user and is not transferable.
- Minors over the age of 16 may only use a non-electric bike that has been rented by an account holder. These users must wear a helmet.

If you are an account holder and you rent a non electric LimeBike on behalf of your child who is over 16 please make sure they meet and are following the legal requirements.

GCS students do not meet the age criteria to either open a LimeBike account or ride an electric LimeBike.

At GCS, any student seen riding a LimeBike who does not meet the legal requirements will be referred to the Behaviour Team and their parents/cares will be informed.



Advice on vaping (e-cigarettes or e-liquids), traditional cigarettes & tobacco

In the UK it is illegal to purchase use or e-cigarettes or e-liquids if you are under the age of 18. UK The government updated the laws on the sale of tobacco and products vaping on. October 1st 2015. This illegal for made it e-cigarette retailers to sell vaping products to



anyone under the age of 18. It also made it illegal for someone aged 18 or over to purchase vaping products on the behalf of anyone underage. The same rules apply for traditional cigarettes and tobacco.

It is illegal for our students to buy, be in possession of or use vaping products, cigarettes or tobacco. We ask that parents and carers be vigilant to ensure that their child is not using these products. The above diagram may assist you in identifying these products.

At GCS we take the illegal use of vaping products, cigarettes or tobacco very seriously. Any student found in possession of vaping products, cigarettes or tobacco will be referred to the Behaviour Team and their parents/carers will be contacted.

ATTENDANCE, UNAUTHORISED ABSENCES & SCHOOL HOLIDAYS

There is a very clear link between good attendance at school and good educational outcomes. Every day in school counts towards your child's future, so excellent school attendance is very important.

Haringey Council issue penalty fines to parents/carers whose children have unauthorised absences from school. An example of an unauthorised absence may be going on holiday during term time. For more information please go to:

Steel Pan group were set up on the side stage and played throughout the evening. Just when we though the evening couldn't get any better, guests were further entertained during two musical performances by our talented students.



NSPCC Mental Health Awareness Week Monday 15th – Sunday 21st May

DESMO At Gladesmore we take mental health very seriously, and have counsellors onsite to advise when students need emotional support. We also have direct links with CAMHS and other health services.

What does mental health mean?

Mental health is an individual's cognitive, behavioural and emotional wellbeing (Mind, 2020). It's something we all have - including every child and young person.

We use the term "mental health issues" to refer to mental health problems, conditions and mental illnesses. These issues may or may not be medically diagnosed.

Negative experiences such as abuse and neglect can adversely impact a child's mental health. Mental health issues can also sometimes lead to safeguarding and child protection issues, for example if a child's mental health begins to put them or other people at risk of harm.

Risk factors may include, but are not limited to:

- Long term abuse and neglect
- Having additional needs and disabilities
- Belonging to a minority ethnic community
- Adverse life experiences
- LGBTQ+ children & young people

If you have any concerns about mental health, contact your general practitioner.

They had the unique opportunity to observe and interact with female scientists, witnessing their ground-breaking work first-hand in the lab through demonstrations and projects that showcased the diverse roles that women play in scientific research.
