Safer Schools Partnership



Gladesmore is part of the Safer Schools Partnership which is a scheme whereby members of the local police work closely with schools in order to keep young people safe, reduce crime and the fear of crime and improve behaviour in schools and their communities.

On Wednesday 15th November as part of this initiative, officers from the Metropolitan Police Mounted Branch visited Gladesmore. Students had the opportunity to engage with the officers and the amazing horses they work with.

Our students were very comfortable around the horses, though a number commented on never having seen a horse up close and they were surprised at how big they actually were. One student was very happy to be around them as she said the experience reminded her of the horses she helped rear when she lived on a farm. It was an all round positive experience.

Advice on using e-scooters



E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the <u>Road Traffic Act 1988</u>. This means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters including the need to have a valid driving licence, vehicle insurance and road tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private e-scooter you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

Legal use of an e-scooter

Some local councils are running trial e-scooter rental schemes. Provided you are over 18, have a driving licence and follow road traffic regulations, it is legal to use a rental e-scooter in participating boroughs. Please note Haringey Council is not part of any trial e-scooter scheme, it is therefore illegal to ride an e-scooter on any public roads, pavements or cycle paths in Haringey.

It is legal to use an e-scooter on private land only with the permission of the land owner.

Are e-scooters permitted on school premises?

No, students are not legally permitted to ride an e-scooter therefore e-scooters must not be brought to or stored at school at anytime. GCS takes no responsibility for the loss, damage or theft of these devices if stored on school grounds.

What happens if my child is seen using an e-scooter?

Students are not legally permitted to ride an e-scooter on public roads, any student seen using an e-scooter will be referred to the Behaviour Team, their parents/carers will be informed and a sanction will be put in place up to and including suspension from school.

Advice on using LimeBikes

LimeBike provide bicycles for short term rental for local journeys. Users must first set up an account via the LimeBike app. As stated in the 'Terms and Conditions' of LimeBike:



- Account holders must be over 18.
- A user's account is connected to the user's debit card and each time a LimeBike is used the cost of rental and mileage is charged to the users debit card.
- An account is personal to each user and is not transferable.
- <u>Minors over the age of 16 may only use a non-electric bike that has been rented by an account holder</u>. These users must wear a helmet.

If your child rides a LimeBike please make sure they meet and are following the legal requirements.

GCS students do not meet the age criteria to open a LimeBike account. To ride a bike which has been leased by an account holder, students must be over 16.

At GCS any student seen riding a LimeBike who does not meet the legal requirements will be referred to the Behaviour Team, their parents/carers will be informed and a sanction will be put in place up to and including suspension from school.

Advice on vaping (e-cigarettes or e-liquids), traditional cigarettes & tobacco

In the UK it is illegal to use or purchase e-cigarettes or e-liquids if you are under the age of 18. The UK government updated the laws on the sale of tobacco and vaping products on 1st of October 2015. This made it illegal for e-cigarette retailers to sell vaping products to anyone under the age of 18. It also made it illegal for someone aged 18 or over to purchase vaping products on the behalf of anyone underage. The same rules apply for traditional cigarettes and tobacco.

Traditional cigarettes, tobacco and most vapes contain nicotine which is highly addictive.

Vapes are a relative new product and it's use and availability has only recently become widespread, therefore research into it's side effects is in its infancy, but there is strong evidence that the brains of children and young people who are still developing are more sensitive to the side effect caused by nicotine. The side effects of vaping include coughing, dry mouth and throat, shortness of breath, mouth and throat irritation and headaches.

Nicotine is a toxin which can result in poisoning. Symptoms of nicotine poisoning include nausea and vomiting, headaches and stomach pains, and in more severe cases it can lead to convulsions, depressed breathing and heartbeat, and death.

The smoke from traditional cigarettes and tobacco is known to contain thousands of poisonous chemicals at least seventy of which are known to cause cancer. These chemicals include: tar, arsenic, benzene, cadmium, ethanol, formaldehyde, chromium, acrolein, hydrogen cyanide, carbon monoxide and ammonia. Smoking is known to damage nearly every organ of the body causing debilitating and life threatening illnesses such as: lung disease including emphysema and chronic bronchitis, heart and circulatory disease including heart attack and stroke, many types of cancer including lung, mouth, throat, stomach, liver, kidney, bowel, bladder and cervical cancer. Smoking increases the risk of developing Type 2 Diabetes, eye disease and dementia. It is known to reduce fertility in both men and women and cause serious problems during pregnancy for the unborn child. Smoking increases anxiety and tension. Smokers are also more likely than non-smokers to develop depression over time.

Any student found in possession of vaping products, cigarettes or tobacco will be referred to the Behaviour Team, the vape or tobacco product will be confiscated, their parents/carers will be informed and a sanction will be put in place up to and including suspension from school.

The Dangers of Cannabis Edibles

We want parents to be aware of cannabis edibles which are increasingly being offered to young people across the country.

Cannabis edibles are food products which contain Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the mood altering ingredient from cannabis. They are illegal but available in many different forms, including cakes, sweets, chocolates, drinks, syrups, butters or spreads and oils.

Although cannabis edibles contain an element of the Class B drug, they do not have the smell or appearance of cannabis. Instead, they look and smell like a normal

shop-bought food item but can be stronger than other cannabis products. Because of how they are packaged, they can be particularly appealing to young people and teenagers, who may call them 'gummies' or 'bites'. These edibles may also contain other illicit substances.

Long-term cannabis use can be especially concerning in teenagers. It may increase the risk of mental health conditions, such as schizophrenia or psychosis, as well as having an adverse impact on learning and memory.

Please be vigilant with your children. If you suspect your child has taken a cannabis edible you must seek medical advice immediately.
