Every time our students ~ your children go out into the community wearing their school uniform they represent the Gladesmore family and our REACH values (see page 2).



As with every family, 'our' children's safety is of paramount importance to us both inside and outside of the school premises.

To ensure that all children are safe after school it is vital that they make their way straight home as soon as school day ends.

The school day ends as follows:

At the end of each school day in an effort to ensure the children's journey home is safe, staff escort them to the High Road, wait with them for the first buses to arrive and make sure that they board the buses safely.

Working with us to ensure your child's journey home is a safe one, please make sure that ...

- your child goes straight home after school.
- your child does not bring any high value items to school. If they do, they do they so at
 their own risk and they should be told never to use them in public places such as on the
 road or whilst travelling on a bus or a train.
- your child always crosses the road using proper pedestrian crossings.
- if your child attends an after-school activity make sure you know where it is and what time it ends so that you know what time to expect them home.
- if your child has siblings in the school tell them to travel home together. Similarly, if your child has friends who live close by it might be a good idea for you to arrange with their parents/carers for your children to travel home together.

'The Oddballs' & 'Coppafeel' ~ Presentation to Year 8 Students


This term we began working with two new charities whose work promotes awareness about health changes in our bodies and the importance of early detection of these changes through self checking.
